ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Sammy Miller (Drums + Vocals)

Sammy Miller and The Congregation are on a mission to put the generosity back into jazz and bring art back to the people. Juilliard trained and drummer on a Grammy nominated album, Sammy Miller has been hailed as "the perfect player scholar" (*The Wall Street Journal*)

Miller has spent the last decade making jazz accessible to a new generation of listeners and learners. From Lincoln Center to The White House, TEDx to The Newport Jazz Festival, with special guests including Jon Batiste and Wynton Marsalis, Miller's band, Sammy Miller and The Congregation, has headlined the most prominent Jazz festivals for over a decade. The Congregation specializes in joyful jazz – music that feels good.

After working with over 60,000 students in 45 states, Miller launched the music education platform PLAYBOOK to offer teachers the tools to inspire lifelong musicians. Miller recently discussed his music education philosophy in his New York Times op-ed titled We're Teaching Music to Kids All Wrong.

Ben Flocks (Tenor Saxophone)

Saxophonist and educator Ben Flocks captivates audiences around the world with his soulful sound. Born in Santa Cruz, California and residing in Los Angeles, Ben leads his own group and plays as a sideman in a variety of musical settings.

Ben has led his band at the Monterey Jazz Festival and the Bern Jazz Festival in Switzerland, and has had the honor to perform with Joshua Redman's Trio, with Dave Brubeck as a Brubeck Institute Fellow, with Thana Alexa's Quintet, with Antonio Sanchez and Migration and with Sammy Miller and the Congregation.

Ben holds a MA in Music Education from San José State University and a BFA from the New School in New York and currently serves on faculty at Glendale Community College, Harvard-Westlake School, and the Stanford Jazz Workshop. Ben has a passion for music education and teaches saxophone lessons, improvisation courses, and ensembles utilizing focused listening and peer-mentorship methods. He also leads interactive concerts in schools for all ages tracing the history of jazz.

Corbin Jones (Bass)

California-born, Colorado-raised arranger and multi-instrumentalist Corbin Jones has credits with such artists as Beyoncé, Jay-Z, Lizzo, Lucky Daye, Lupe Fiasco, Gwen Stefani, and Kendrick Lamar. He's performed at Coachella, Walt Disney Concert Hall, Newport Jazz Festival, Jazz @ Lincoln Center and on NPR's Tiny Desk Concert Series. A Los Angeles-based graduate of the USC Thornton School's Jazz Studies program, Jones' love of groove has led him to a career on not only double bass, but bass guitar, synth bass, sousaphone, baritone saxophone, and leading his own group, The Corbin Jones Big Band.

David Linard (Piano)

Grammy Nominated and Juilliard trained, David Linard shares his love for timeless feel-good music as a pianist, composer, educator, and musical director.

In September 2023, he released his debut record, Nearsighted with a wide range of special guests - including Alphonso Horne, Tucci Swing and Sammy Miller.

David, as longtime member of Sammy Miller and The Congregation, continues to collaborate closely with Miller

in a plethora of different outlets ranging from the theater, to international jazz festivals, to Miller's newest project, the musical education platform PLAYBOOK.

During the pandemic, Linard, with the Brooklyn based band Wayne Tucker and the Bad Mothas played in Prospect Park nearly daily, creating a (surprisingly well attended) makeshift jazz club out of a park curb. Although they're back indoors now, this band continues to be a staple of the New York music scene.

Molly Miller (Guitar)

Since Dr. Molly Miller picked up the guitar at age seven, she's been captivating audiences with her sophisticated and raw style. She's one of Los Angeles's most sought-after musicians, recording and touring with artists such as Jason Mraz, Black Eyed Peas and Sin Bandera, at venues such as the Hollywood Bowl, Royal Albert Hall and Coachella.

Miller heads her own trio, Molly Miller Trio, with legends Jennifer Condos and Jay Bellerose. Their music has been showcased on NPR's Fresh Air and their 2021 release, St. George, was featured in major outlets such as Guitar Player, Guitar World, Fretboard Journal, and Vintage Guitar. Molly Miller Trio has toured opening for Jason Mraz and performed at iconic spaces such as Monterey Jazz Festival, Dizzy's at Lincoln Center, and SF Jazz.

Soon after earning her Doctorate in Musical Arts from the University of Southern California in 2016, she became the chair of the Guitar Department at Los Angeles College of Music. She returned to her alma mater, USC, as a Professor of Studio Guitar in 2022.

DESIGN FOR SHARING (DFS)

Each year, Design for Sharing (DFS) brings thousands of K-12 public school students from across Los Angeles to CAP UCLA venues for free performances and interactive workshops with professional artists.

DFS programs are open to any public school in greater Los Angeles, and are always free to attend.
