ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Justin Alston – Actor, Collaborator, Performer

Justin Alston is a Brooklyn-born actor who is thrilled to be a part of *Arms Around America*. Alston got his start studying theater at Duke university before heading to LA in 2002. He has been nominated twice for an NAACP Theatre Award, and he recently guest-starred on *9-1-1 Lone Star* opposite Rob Lowe and Gina Torres. His most important role to date is Dad to his daughter River, who continually shows him the true meaning of love and growth.

Sola Bamis – Actor, Collaborator

Sola Bamis is an actress, writer, performance artist, and filmmaker. A SAG Award nominee, she has appeared in television shows, regional theater world premieres, and voice-overs in video games and commercials. She produced and starred in two short films shot in Nigeria. Her next film script, *Crocodile*, has received awards such as Lecture Series Short Narrative Screenplay Competition from the 2021 Reel Sisters of the Diaspora Film Festival, the 2018 Film Daily Screenwriting Contest, and Atlanta Film Festival Screenplay Competitions. Her one-woman show, *The Tutorial*, incorporates transformative storytelling, performance art, and Revolutionary Theater to deliver a vital prescription for Black women's self-love and expression. She received her MFA from the California Institute of the Arts.

Dan Froot – Producer, Writer, Director, Live Sound Effects

Dan Froot's work has toured internationally since 1983. Awards include a Bessie (New York Dance & Performance Award), a City of Los Angeles Artist Fellowship, and a Foundation for Jewish Culture Playwriting Fellowship. He has collaborated with Dan Hurlin, Yoshiko Chuma, Ping Chong, David Dorfman, Mabou Mines, Ralph Lemon, Cornerstone Theater Company and Victoria Marks, among others. He was on the faculty of UCLA's Department of World Arts and Cultures/Dance from 2000 to 2024. <u>danfroot.com</u>

Donna Simone Johnson – Actor, Collaborator, Performer

Donna Simone Johnson is a two-time NAACP Award-winning

actor, director, choreographer, and educator. In addition to her work with Dan Froot & Company on *Pang!* and now *Arms Around America*, she can be seen (and heard) in a wide range of commercials and audiobooks. Some regional theater credits include *Power of Sail* (The Geffen Playhouse), Joe Turner's *Come and Gone* (NY Resident Acting Company), and performances at La Mama, The Guthrie, Virginia Stage Company, Portland Center Stage, The Road Theatre Company and The Oregon Shakespeare Festival, where she is a proud company member. She also serves as Co-Artistic Director of Watts Village Theater Company, which nurtures and produces diaspora-driven work while celebrating the rich history and cultural diversity of South LA. Johnson holds an MA in Dance from NYU and an MFA in Acting from CalArts – and carries with her a deep sense of gratitude.

Natalie Camunas – Actor, Collaborator

Natalie Camunas is a Los Angeles native, USC Annenberg graduate, and queer identified artist. As an actor, Camunas has worked regionally in theaters across the country, including originating the role of Gabby Orozco in the world premiere coproduction of *American Mariachi* at the Old Globe Theatre, and Denver Center for the Performing Arts. Television credits include Goliath, Speechless, and Major Crimes. As a writer, Camunas's plays have been produced in L.A., NYC, and Ireland. Currently, she is working on a new play in development with The Vagrancy's Writers' Group. She is also in production of a podcast centered around Native Gardens, one of the most produced plays of 2019. <u>nataliecamunas.com</u>

Krysta Gonzales – Actor, Collaborator, Performer

Krysta Gonzales (she/they) is a TX-born, L.A.-based performer, writer and chingona. She earned a BFA with honors in Theatre from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts, Experimental Theatre Wing and has also studied improv at the Groundlings School. Notable credits include Pixar's *Inside Out 2* and Oscar-nominated *Elemental*, in addition to *Cake* on FX. Most of the plays they've written are available to view or listen to online for free, thanks to the support of HowlRound, the VORTEX, Teatro Vivo, the Generic Ensemble Company, and the Distilled Theatre Company. Anthony Rey Perez – Actor, Collaborator, Performer

Anthony Rey Perez is originally from Miami. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts from Florida State's conservatory-style theater program. Over the years in Los Angeles and New York he has worked in various film, television and commercial projects, including significant voice-over work, as well as appearing Off Broadway. He most recently played a young Andy Garcia in the new Latine-centered *Father Of the Bride*. Perez, the son of immigrants (and loving Husband of one), doesn't take lightly the opportunity to represent a fuller, more rich representation of Americans in the mainstream narrative for the next generation, including his beautiful daughter Luna.

Christopher Rivas – Actor, Collaborator

Christopher Rivas is an actor, author, podcaster and storyteller. Part memoir, part social commentary, his book *Brown Enough* charts authentic self-discovery alongside racial awakening amidst the struggle to be "perfectly" Latinx, woke, and as brown as possible in America. He recently developed two podcasts with SiriusXM's Stitcher: *Brown Enough*, which parallels the themes of his book through interviews; and Rubirosa, an investigation of Porfirio Rubirosa, the Dominican diplomat, race car driver, and polo player believed to have inspired the character "James Bond." Julio Montero – Composer

Julio Montero was born in Guayaquil, Ecuador, but grew up in New York City. He has collaborated with choreographers Alexx Shilling, Cheng Chieh Yu, Sarah Jacobs, DaEun Jung, Richard Rivera's Physual, Wilfried Souly's Souly Dance Arts, and Rayven Armijo/cuerva urban folklorico, and others, to compose original scores. He was founder and songwriter for Latin Alternative Folk band Cuñao. Cuñao was commissioned by The Wooden Floor Artistic Director Melanie Rios-Glaser to compose new original music for the piece *Playground & Playground II*, performed by The Wooden Floor students at The Irvine Barclay Theatre (Irvine, CA). In 2018, Montero and Cuñao performed Cancion Del Inmigrante, a multimedia folk opera in collaboration with alexx makes dances and One Grain of Sand Puppet Theater, at the Bowers Museum. Currently residing in Freehold, NJ, he is an audio production technician at Princeton Univeristy's Richardson Auditorium, a freelance podcast editor, and always working on new music. Montero holds a Master of Professional Studies in Arts and Cultural Management from Pratt.

Julian Gomez – Musician

Julian Gomez is a bassist/multi-instrumentalist currently performing and teaching throughout Southern California. Growing up in Baldwin Park, Los Angeles, he studied music and bass performance at Los Angeles County High School for the Arts, Colburn School, and Pasadena City College, where he became immersed in the multitude of styles within jazz and Latin music. During this time, he received the Shelly Manne Memorial New Talent Award from the Los Angeles Jazz Society and also toured Houston and New York with the Thelonious Monk Institute's Peer-to-Peer Jazz Education Initiative, performing and taking part in jazz education workshops alongside worldrenowned saxophonists Antonio Hart and Don Braden. Aside from live performances and recording sessions, he has worked as a freelance producer and composer for various groups and independent projects. He is a member of the group Coras, a Cumbia/soul band, and the mambo revival big band, Los Chicos Del Mambo.

Tom Moose – Musician

Tom Moose is a Los Angeles-based multi-instrumentalist and composer. A classically trained violinist, he holds a B.A. in Music and Theater Performance. He was nominated for a Horton award for his work as a composer for dance. He performs a variety of music, including bluegrass (his band, Ikes Creek, won the 2019 Topanga Fiddle Festival), alternative South American folk (Cuñao), classical, jazz (cool beat borscht), Django jazz, neo soul, and klezmer (mostly Kosher). Moose has performed at REDCAT's NOW Festival, Highways, UCLA, Disneyland (and -world) and The Golden Globes. @tommoosemusic

Isaac Rodriguez – Musician

Isaac Rodriguez is a Las Vegas-based multi-instrumentalist, born and raised in Puerto Rico, who discovered his passion for

music at a very early age. He studied to be a music teacher and taught multiple instruments to kids and adults for many years. He also worked as a roadie and stage manager for various artists on the island. Music has taken Rodriguez to many stages around Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, México, Colombia, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Honduras, and several States of the American Nation. He has performed in various renowned festivals such as: Feria de las Flores de San Ángel, SXSW, Pepsi Summer Stage, Fiestas de la Calle San Sebastián, Lightning in a Bottle, Hollywood Forever's Day of the Dead, California WorldFest, LALIFF, L Festival, and Donkey Creek Festival. He has also worked on countless projects and recordings comprised of multiple musical genres, but mainly Nova-Trova, Latin and folk. In addition to many local artists from every city in which he has lived, Rodriguez has also worked with renowned international artists like Wisin & Yandel, Carlos Baute, Vicente García, Bersuit Vergarabat, Shadmehr Aghili, Sie7e, Yaire, and El Twanguero.

Bobby Gordon – Dramaturge, Collaborator

Bobby Gordon is a poet, performance maker, and Theatre of the Oppressed practitioner with an M.A. in Applied Theatre Arts from the University of Southern California (USC). He is a cofounder of the Melrose Poetry Bureau, teaches at UCLA in the Department of World Arts & Cultures/Dance, and has created work with ensembles across the Americas and in South Africa.

Marcus Kuiland-Nazario – Set Designer

Marcus Kuiland-Nazario is an interdisciplinary artist, producer, and curator. His practice spans sculpture, video installation, social practice, performance, and design. Kuiland-Nazario's works are long-term research-based cross-genre projects exploring extreme states of emotion such as grief, anger, and loss influenced by the cultural and spiritual traditions of the African Diaspora. His installations and performances have been featured in museums in the United States and abroad. Kuiland-Nazario is the 2024 inaugural recipient of the Jacki Apple Award in Performance. He also received the Santa Monica Artist Fellowship award and an Artist At Work Fellowship. Kuiland-Nazario is a founding artist of the 18th Street Arts Center, where he is currently an Artist in Residence.

Duncan Woodbury – Sound Designer

Duncan Woodbury is a sound designer and composer based in Los Angeles working on a range of creative projects including music, theater, dance, installation, and podcasting. Woodbury currently serves as Associate Technical Director of the UCLA Nimoy Theater. His previous collaborators include Lars Jan/Early Morning Opera, Andrew Schneider, Zoe Aja Moore, and Milka Djorjevich, among others. He is a graduate of Herb Alpert School of Music at CalArts in Music Technology.

Antony Gutierrez – Lighting Designer

Antony Gutierrez is very excited to be a part of *Arms Around America*. His work has been seen in many productions at UCLA, where he serves as the Lighting Supervisor for Royce Hall.
