ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Piehole is a live arts collective that draws from a shared fascination with objects, media and handmade universes, to pursue delight, humor and beauty in unexpected places. Their work encourages audience agency, as well as an expanded sense of potential realities. Since 2008, Piehole has made sixteen major performance projects for live and virtual spaces. Recent works include Christmas Mountain, an interactive advent calendar media installation at WNYC's The Greene Space, and Disclaimer at Under the Radar (Drama League Award Nominee). Piehole also collaborated with the L.A.-based Tender Claws on awardwinning XR games The Under Presents and Tendar. Piehole has received support from The Public Theater, New Georges, Lower Manhattan Cultural Council, New York Theatre Workshop, The Drama League and The New Ohio, as well as NYC Women's Fund, Jerome Foundation, Puffin Foundation, NYSCA-A.R.T./New York, Foundation for Contemporary Arts, Mental Insight Foundation and Puppeteers of America. Tara Ahmadinejad (writer/co-director/performer) is an Obie award-winning NYC theater artist and co-founder of the live arts collective Piehole. Recent directing credits include *Grief Hotel* by Liza Birkenmeier (Clubbed Thumb / The Public, Obie,

Drama League Award Nominee), mounin by Gelsey Bell (Prototype Festival, currently on tour in the US) and Lunch Bunch by Adrian Einspanier (PlayCo, Clubbed Thumb, NY Times Critic's Pick). With Piehole, recent works include Christmas Mountain, and their newest project, For You Alone, a current HARP project at HERE Arts Center. Tara teaches at Queens College, CUNY. New Georges Affiliated Artist; Pig Iron Resident Futurist; NYTW Usual Suspect. MFA Columbia University.

Reza Behjat (lighting designer) is an Obie award-winning lighting designer based in New York City. He began his career in Iran, where he worked with some prominent directors for several years. Reza's works have been shown on Off-Broadway and in regional theaters across the United States such as The Public Theater, Playwrights Horizons, Atlantic Theater, Minetta Lane, Lucille Lortel, The Guthrie Theater, Actors Theater of Louisville, Berkeley Rep, Alabama Shakespeare and many more. Reza won an Obie Award in the design category for his work on two productions of *English* and *Wish You Were Here* in 2023. In addition, alongside the cast and the creative team of *English*, he received a Special Citation from the Obie Award. Also, he is the winner of the prestigious award of The Knight of Illumination for *Nina Simone: Four Women* in 2019.

Ali Lopez-Sohaili (performer) – Off-Broadway: *Power Strip* (Lincoln Center LCT3), *Disgraced*, (Alliance Theater, Suzi Bass nomination). Television/film: *Manifest, Law & Order SVU, The Unknown Country,* and the upcoming 2025 Netflix movie *Nonnas* opposite Vince Vaughn and Lorraine Bracco. Ali is an L.A. native. Juilliard 2013.

Alexandra Panzer (scenic designer) is an interdisciplinary artist based in Santa Cruz and New York City. She is a member of the live arts collective Piehole, with whom — as a performer, writer and designer — she has made eleven works for theaters, galleries, AR/VR platforms, video streams and installations. Her work with Piehole was most recently featured at WNYC's The Greene Space, The Public Theater and The Sundance New Frontier Lab. Panzer wrote, directed and performed *The Language of Birds*, a collaboration with composer Carolyn Chen and sculptor Natalie

Jenkins, presented by Indexical and the Santa Cruz Museum of Art and History (Evergreen Cemetery, Santa Cruz, 2022). Panzer is a producer and voiceover artist for TED-Ed.

Eli Schleicher (assistant director, stage manager) (he/him) is an artist and arts administrator. He has collaborated on new work at/with The Public Theater, Manhattan Theatre Club, The Araca Group, Kevin McCollum's Alchemation, Target Margin Theater, The Fire This Time Festival, National Black Theatre, New Saloon and Piehole, among others. Directing highlights include his immersive club production of *The Laramie Project* at the American Repertory Theater's OBERON, *d.ark/ness* at The Tank, and *Don't Laugh. It's Funny.* with The Strides Collective. He is also Director & Co-Founder of JETco., a company dedicated to creating extraordinary gatherings that inform and inspire. Recent works include *Alonely, Toda, The Myth of Creation* and *Starters*. Currently, Eli works as a strategic and tactical partner to nonprofits as a Project Manager at Advance NYC. elischleicher.com

Emilie Soffe (line producer) is an Asheville-based actor and director specializing in devised and experimental theater. As a member of the live arts collective Piehole, Emilie has co-authored and performed in original works for theaters, windows and digital platforms, including AR and VR collaborations with *Tender Claws Tendar* (Sundance 2018) and *The Under Presents* (Oculus, Emmy Finalist). Recently, she played the title role in *Richard II* with Montford Park Players in Asheville.

Ben Vigus (sound designer/video designer) is a New York-based sound designer and actor. Piehole core member (HARP recipient 2024, Jerome finalist 2021). Recent sound: Lunch Bunch (PlayCo), Christmas Mountain (Piehole in collaboration with New Georges, WNYC Greene Space), Underground Fairy (Japan Society), Disclaimer (Under the Radar 2021, NYC Women's Fund recipient), Bad at Birthdays (feature film by Jesse Thurston), Clambake (short film by Sammy Zeisel), Unbearable (animated short by Stephen Sues). Brooklyn College Sonic Arts MFA candidate.

Jeff Wood (co-director/video designer) is an interdisciplinary artist and educator in NYC. He is a co-founder of live arts collective Piehole, with whom he performs, designs handmade and media elements, and co-conceives original projects, most recently: Christmas Mountain, an interactive animatronic window installation (WNYC's Greene Space); Disclaimer (The Public Theater's Under the Radar Festival); The Under Presents, an Oculus Quest VR experience incorporating live performers (with Tender Claws); and Tread on Me Tread Softly, an audio-guided group experience in collaboration with Celine Song. In his work at Beam Center, he coordinates collaborative, hands-on projects in NYC public schools to create radical spaces of youth agency and co-learning. He plays drums in the band Lame Drivers. MFA Performance and Interactive Media Arts, Brooklyn College.
