It's the 1970's and Fereydoun Farrokhzad's star is blazing bright – he's a sex symbol and chart-topping pop singer – imagine an Iranian Tom Jones. A decade on and he's living in political exile in Germany, though still performing to soldout audiences in Europe.

On 7 August 1992, he's found brutally murdered. The neighbours say his dogs had been barking for two nights.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Javaad Alipoor

Javaad Alipoor is a British-Iranian writer, director and performer. He founded The Javaad Alipoor Company in 2019. The Company's most recent work, *Things Hidden Since the Foundation of the World*, opened to five-star reviews and sell-out audiences at Battersea Arts Centre and HOME, Manchester. *Things Hidden Since the Foundation of the World* then began a world tour, opening in the USA at The University of Michigan and Australia at The Sydney Opera House.

Previously, Javaad Alipoor wrote, co-directed and performed in *The Believers Are But Brothers* as an international touring show, and wrote and performed in the TV adaptation for BBC Four. Its follow up, *Rich Kids: A History of Shopping Malls in Tehran*, also co-created

with Kirsty Housley, won a Fringe First Award before the COVID-19 lockdown led it to transform into an immersive digital experience. The digital version opened at Battersea Arts Centre, before it toured to Sundance Film Festival and The Public Theatre's Under the Radar Festival.

Together with Chris Thorpe, Javaad Alipoor wrote and directed the trilingual theatre production, *Made of Mannheim*, which had its world premiere with Nationaltheater Mannheim and Theaterhaus G7.

Javaad was Resident Associate Director at Sheffield Theatres from 2017-18 where he directed a new version of *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*. Prior to this he was Associate Director at Bradford's Theatre in the Mill from 2015-17. Javaad is involved in politics and activism, cofounding The International Alliance in Support of Iranian Workers, The Syria Solidarity Campaign and a Bradford-based network supporting EU migrants after Brexit. His writing about politics and culture has been featured in The Guardian, The Independent and The Stage. His plays have been published by Oberon and Nick Hern, and his poetry by Art in Usual Places.

Chris Thorpe

Chris is a writer and performer from Manchester. His work tours and is produced in the UK and internationally. He has collaborated with Javaad on several projects, including dramaturgy on *The Believers Are But Brothers* and *Rich Kids: A History of Shopping Malls in Tehran*, as well as co-writing and dramaturgy on *Things Hidden Since the Foundation of the World.* In 2021 Chris and Javaad also co-wrote and directed *Made of Mannheim* for Nationaltheater Mannheim, Germany. Chris also has ongoing collaborations with artists and companies including Rachel Chavkin, China Plate, Yusra Warsama and Portugal's mala voadora. Work as a writer includes Victory Condition, and the film *What do*

You Want Me To Say for the Royal Court, There Has Possibly Been an Incident and The Mysteries for the Royal Exchange and Beowulf for the Unicorn. Upcoming work includes a new, as-yet-untitled large scale piece co-written with Javaad Alipoor, The Soprano Always Dies, for mala voadora/Portuguese National Opera, Always Maybe The Last Time for the Royal Court, and A Family Business and Talking About The Fire for Staatstheater Mainz/China Plate - two shows about nuclear treaty negotiation and disarmament, developed with diplomats, activists and NGOs, touring the UK and internationally in 2024/5. As well as writing, Chris also mentors writers with a particular focus on working with young people in the care system, post-prison groups, and addiction recovery.

Natalie Diddams

Natalie Diddams is a dramaturg, director and academic researcher based in Manchester. Notable productions include *A Series of Metaphors About a Plague* (HOME, Manchester), *The Believers Are But Brothers* (International Tour), B!RTH (Royal Exchange Theatre), and *Thesmo* (National Tour). Natalie has a PhD from Manchester Metropolitan University, and is an Assistant Professor at the University of Warwick. Through her research, Natalie is a leading voice on the intersection between comedy and contemporary politics, and regularly hosts workshops and performances aimed at empowering participants through comedy. Natalie is an Associate Artist of The Javaad Alipoor Company, Trestle Theatre, and the International Schools Theatre Association (ISTA).

Raam Emami

Raam is an Iranian musician, writer, actor and podcast host. He started his musical career in the undergrounds of Tehran. With a great deal of international press behind his band, including features in New York Times, MTV, Billboard, NPR, CNN, VICE, NME and Vanity Fair, Raam paved the way for a new generation of aspiring underground Iranian artists. In January 2018, Raam's father, Kavous Seved Emami, a prominent environmentalist, was arrested in Tehran under false charges of espionage. Two weeks after his arrest he was killed in Iran's notorious Evin Prison. Raam and his family attempted to flee Iran, but the authorities detained his mother and confiscated her passport. Raam and his brother were allowed to leave, but his mother was held hostage in Iran for 582 days. Besides his live shows with his band. Raam has also channeled his creative energy into a oneman storytelling performance called "Departure" about his family's experience and his father's legacy, woven together with his music. He also has a podcast in Persian called

"Masty o Rasty," since its inception in 2020 the show has had over forty million streams.

Me-Lee Hay

Me-Lee Hay composes for film, TV, dance and theatre. A Malaysian born Chinese- Australian, she has had works shown across multiple platforms including Netflix, Amazon Prime, Tubi, commercial TV channels and mainstream cinemas plus international planetariums and film festivals including Canne and Sitges. Off the screen, Me-Lee has been commissioned by leading arts companies of Australia such as Sydney Dance Company's PPY, Sydney Theatre Company as well as performing at the Sydney Opera House. Me-Lee received her debut nomination at the Sydney Theatre Awards in 2024 for Best Composer and Sound Designer in Independent Theatre (*Face of Jizo*) as well as her first AACTA (Australian Academy of Cinema and Television Arts) nomination for Best Original Score in Film in the same year (*Suka*).

Classically trained in piano and cello, Me-Lee is a graduate of the Australian Film Television Radio School (AFTRS), an Associate Composer Representative of the Australian Music Centre and was the Vice President of the Australian Guild of Screen Composers for 4 years. She composed for her first ballet in 2024 entitled GOLD presented at Parramatta Riverside Theatre (Sydney), a magical children's ballet set in the Australian bush during the historic gold rush era.

McCorry's recent work is a combination of loop based cello compositions and atmospheric improvisations, field recordings and modular synth.

The studio creates mesmerising, meaningful and memorable encounters that empower people through the use of light, sound and moving image. Animation is central to the studio's output, taking traditional workflows and expanding on them through the use of emerging technologies. Their work can be seen in theatres and music halls, at festivals, large- scale public events and online.

Barret is an award-winning video artist and digital projection designer. His company, Vent Media, was created after his master's degree in 'Collaborative Arts Practice'

at Trent University, Nottingham. Vent Media specialises in creating and staging visual media for live performance including theatre, dance and music events, gallery installations, film productions and architectural projection. Barret has continued to refine his practice, working on cutting-edge techniques and hardware to create a huge array of visual digital experiences.

Clients and commissions have included the BBC, 59 Productions, Game City, Sadlers Wells, Red Bull, DreamThinkSpeak, Warp Films and Glastonbury Festival. Barret has toured nationally as a VJ for many years and has collaborated with DJ Yoda, Fat Boy Slim, Ghostface Killah and Roni Size, amongst many others. His theatre and dance collaborations have had international recognition including touring in Asia, North America and across Europe.

Dylan Tate

Dylan has worked in a range of roles across the industry since 2008. He splits his career as a stage manager, director and videographer. Often producing and consulting on work across the UK with companies and individuals. He has toured internationally and around the UK as a filmmaker and performer. A founding member of Flabbergast Theatre, Associate Artist of Futures Theatre Company and Director of Tate Creations. Enjoying all aspects of theatre and film, he is proud to be involved with The Javaad Alipoor Company.

Daniel Potter

Daniel is an arts management professional based in Sydney, Australia and holds a post-graduate degree in Arts and Entertainment Management (Deakin University), graduating with distinction. Daniel has worked extensively with some of Australia's most renowned theatre makers and administrators, leading production and creative teams to countless opening nights across the country and

internationally while holding production management positions at Merrigong Theatre Company and Belvoir. Between 2015 - 2023, Daniel held the position of Executive Director / CEO at Shopfront Arts Co-op., an arts organisation based in Sydney, Australia. Daniel serves on the board of Beyond Empathy, a grass roots organisation that uses community, arts and cultural development practice to create new works, and as chair of the board for Theatre Network NSW, the peak theatre body for the state of New South Wales in Australia. He is a member of Create NSW's Artform Advisory board for Theatre & Musical Theatre. Daniel believes creative expression is crucial to building strong community ties and is passionate about utilising the arts as a tool of empowerment for adults and Young People alike.
